### From the Pastors

Dear Parish Family,

Bianco da Siena, an Italian mystic poet of the Middle Ages, wrote "Come Down, O Love Divine," (Discendi Amor Santo) hymn 508 in the Lutheran Book of Worship. Ralph Vaughn Williams wrote a beautiful tune for the hymn that he named Down Ampney in honor of the village in which he was born.

The hymns lyrics are exquisite in their mystic vision. The first verse reads.

> Come down, O Love divine: Seek thou this soul of mine And visit it with thine own ardor glowing; O Comforter, draw near; Within my heart appear And kindle it, Thy holy flame bestowing.

God descends to us to redeem us and to fill us with His Spirit rather than our ascending to the heavenly realm to receive His salvation and gifts. The whole dynamic of God's relationship with us and the world is His descent to us, not our ascent to Him.

This descent of the Lord comes to clear focus in the incarnation of the Son of God. "And the Word became flesh and made his dwelling among us." (John 1: 14a NIV) The baby at Bethlehem is divine love come down. In Philippians Paul expresses this descent, Jesus "... being in very nature God, did not consider equality with God something to be grasped, but made himself nothing, taking the very nature of a servant, being made in human likeness. And being found in the appearance as a man, he humbled himself and became obedient to death—even death on a cross. (Philippians 2: 6-8 NIV) Our Christmas festival is a celebration of God's descent to us in the Son of God.

# From the Pastors

Before the festival of the Nativity of Our Lord, the season of Advent is kept. During the first Sundays, the theme is the coming of Christ at the end of time. Early Advent continues the emphasis of the last Sundays of Pentecost that come at the end of the Church year. Christ with His angels will descend in the clouds of heaven to judge the world.

Between the first Christmas and the end of time, we are the beneficiaries of God's descent to us. Every Sunday we are nourished by Word and Sacrament which represent the Triune God coming among us to strengthen our faith. The Holy Spirit, the Comforter, uses these means to keep us united to Jesus Christ in faith and the one true faith. (See *The Small Catechism*, Third Article of the Creed)

Paul advises the Philippian Church to conduct herself in all humility and then cites the hymn in part quoted above to illustrate Christ's own humility. Christ descended to us in humility and so we pray with the mystic Bianco da Siena,

Let holy charity
Mine outward vesture be,
And holiness become mine inner clothing—
True lowliness of heart,
Which takes the humbler part,
And o'er its own shortcomings weeps
with loathing

### Through the Bible IN 90 DAYS

90 days is all it takes to read through the whole Bible.

And of course you can do it! You just need an approach that makes sense.

**Here's the secret**: Forget about reading the whole Bible in three months. (That's a pretty formidable challenge). Instead think in these terms:

- 12 short pages a day
- About 45 minutes of your time
- Don't fall behind.

Suddenly it's not so hard.

We will be using a special New International Version (NIV) Translation, of The Bible in 90 Days, that was designed to help you accomplish your 90 day goal and reap some real dividends spiritually and practically in the process.

Why do this? Well, as someone who finds herself more and more impressed with the mysteries of life and less and less impressed with science and human explanations of those mysteries, I find a certain comfort in reading the Bible, with its miracles, feats of endurance, and obedience to God.

Although Holy Trinity had for years read through the Bible in a Year, last year some of us decided to try reading the Bible in 90 Days for the first time. Reading through the Bible in 90 days makes the Bible read like a novel! You ask different questions. We loved it! So we're doing it again in 2014. People who have already done this once are welcome back.

We will meet together weekly to discuss how the reading is going and what we are learning about God and the meaning of human life.

Start Date: January 14, 2014 (I will give out the Bibles today) Meeting Dates: Every Tuesday, January 14, 2013 - April 15, 2014

Meeting Time: 1:00 p.m. and 7:00 p.m.

If you're interested, sign up on the sheet in the narthex.

You can use any Bible you want, but I would recommend <u>The Bible in 90 Days</u> version or a Contemporary English Version. (Do <u>not</u> use a paraphrase like The Living Bible or The Message)

Cost of the Bible through me will be \$20.00. (You can order one yourself on Amazon for less than \$5. You can also order a Bible in 90 Days for your ereader.)

### The Society of the Hours

The Society of the Hours is a new parish organization that will devote itself to the Daily Office. The first meeting of the Society will be on Sunday, January 19, after Sunday School. Lunch will be served. Members are asked to contribute \$6.00 for the cost of lunch.

### The Society of the Hours exists to:

- 1) encourage the daily recitation of the Divine Office by individuals according to evangelical and catholic principles found in the *Lutheran Book of Worship*.
- 2) recite the appropriate Office when the Society meets.
- 3) promote daily use of the Psalms in the Society and the congregation
- 4) emphasize the spiritual value of silence
- 5) give historical, theological, liturgical, and biblical instruction on the prayer offices.
- 6) provide opportunities for the congregation to participate in the Liturgy of the Hours in the chapel of the Good Shepherd and encourage attendance at the Prayer Offices prepared and planned by the Director of Music and choir.
- 7) meet once a month from September to May and once during the summer.

#### The Offices observed are

- 1) Matins/Lauds
- 2) Terce/Sext/None—the little offices during the day.
- 3) Vespers
- 4) Compline

# Christmas Eve at Holy Trinity

In December, along with other Christians around the world, we celebrate two seasons: Advent and Christmas. While department stores and radio stations and everywhere else imaginable are saturated with Christmas carols during the entire Advent season, we reserve these for the season of Christmas (12 days of Christmas, not one day!). So we always have a Sunday morning or two to also sing Christmas carols before Epiphany (January 6).

Advent has its own beautiful and soulful hymns that match the lessons for our Advent services. The Advent themes are watchful waiting, longing for the Savior, the watchman on the wall, the wise and foolish virgins, the people in darkness needing to be comforted, lifting high the gates for the Savior to come in, preparing our hearts and preparing the way before Him...I get goosebumps just thinking about these lessons and these hymns.

And then Christmas Eve arrives and we sing all the famous, beloved carols. We sing several before the service with accompaniment of brass, strings, and bells along with the organ. In the service we enter with the Christmas entrance hymn—"O Come, All Ye Faithful"—calling us to worship. We leave with the mighty exhortation "Good Christian Friends, Rejoice," which recounts the Gospel truths we have heard proclaimed in our Christmas Eve service: now we need not fear the grave, Christ is born.... In all are 16 Christmas hymns, sung either as straight hymns, or used in the liturgical setting we use that night, and only that night.

And what about that liturgical setting for Christmas Eve? We have our very own Christmas setting of Holy Communion—all the normal parts—Kyrie, Gloria, Sanctus (Holy, Holy). Of course we will sing these, because we are not performing a Christmas concert, not putting on a Christmas program. No, we are at worship—hearing the Word proclaimed in lesson and sermon, and receiving our Lord's body and blood. As Lutherans, we know that the words of our liturgy are irreplaceable. The Gloria alone contains the essential doctrines of our faith: the sacrifice of Christ to take away the sins of the world, Christ's identity as the Son of God seated on the right hand of the Father, and the teaching about the persons of the Holy Trinity.

But rather than using LBW settings of the Holy Communion which we use most of the regular Sundays, we have a distinctive Christmas Holy Communion which uses tunes and portions of texts from other parts of the Christmas section in the hymnal. You can look these up!

Our Kyrie is taken from a famous Christmas chant ("O Savior of Our Fallen Race", LBW 49). It includes the Kyrie text with interpolations from this hymn, which expresses our need of a savior.

The Gloria is taken from LBW 47 ("Let All Together Praise Our God"). This important Lutheran Christmas hymn is not a typical carol known by Americans, but I would encourage you to take an LBW and look it up—read the wonderful text which teaches our faith in a very complete way. The text and tune are by Nicolaus Herman, an important hymnwriter from the Reformation period. Like Luther, he used hymns to

express Christian beliefs. This was the function of the early Lutheran hymn—to put song back into the mouths of the congregation and to have that song teach them vital truths of which there was great ignorance in the 1500s.

We use two verses of Luther's Christmas hymn, LBW 51 ("From Heaven Above") as responses. This is another hymn which is well worth getting your LBW and taking a look at. Luther wrote this for his own children to sing. It contains the entire Christmas story along with a verse making it all very personal: "O dearest Jesus, holy child, prepare a bed, soft, undefiled, a holy shrine, within my heart. That You and I need never part."

The Sanctus incorporates LBW 42 ("Of the Father's Love Begotten"), an early chant hymn with Sanctus-like text about adoration by every tongue on earth along with the hosts of heaven. We also use other verses of this as responses.

At Communion we use "What Child is This" (LBW 40) because of its text about nails and spear piercing Him through, and His bearing the cross, "for me, for you."

The Christmas Eve Psalm 98 also incorporates melody from "What Child is This."

The Alleluia quotes the tune of "Oh, Come, All Ye Faithful" (LBW 45).

Our unofficial composer-in-residence, Kile Smith, who has composed so many Alleluias, Psalm settings, anthems, hymntunes for Pastor Mike's wonderful hymns, and a responsory here and an antiphon or canticle there (sometimes on very short notice!) has put together this wonderful liturgical setting (he did our Easter setting too) so that we would have a special, Christmas setting. This was not done with the idea that it would be good for one time and next year we'll have another one. Just like the LBW settings, it is well-written music that lasts (with hours and hours put into it, as you can imagine), that we use from year to year, and only on this night. It is our Christmas liturgical setting.

I look forward to our 2013 Christmas Eve services. The Family Service at 6:30 is always joyous and lovely with the pageant and the young children in church. The 9 pm service is a great celebration of the Feast of the Nativity. We pack as much music into it as we can to celebrate our Savior's birth. But the music is always in service to the Word, because that is the Lutheran way. It is not a concert, nor a program. It is not an Anglican Lessons and Carols, but a service of Holy Communion.

We hope visitors will come and enjoy the service, and that friends and family will join us. God will speak to them as well as to us, through a faithful proclamation of His Word—He's promised that, and it can come only from Him, not from our feeble efforts to enchant or inspire. Our purpose that night is to worship our Lord, to joy in our Savior's birth, and to receive His gifts of Word and sacrament.

More than 600 scores were submitted from all over the world, and the winning composers represent six different countries.

"Where Flames a Word" was commissioned, premiered, and recorded by Philadelphia's The Crossing. The Crossing is also the chorus which premiered and recorded Kile's "Vespers."

A brief music video about each winning composition will be showcased at *khorikos.com* in the coming months, and on the evening of the performance, 1st, 2nd, and 3rd place winners will be chosen through "votes, digital reach, audience feedback and general buzz."


The Women of Holy Trinity will once again be assembling personal care kits for Lutheran World Relief

# Why are Poinsettias the Flower of Christmas?

Bright, flaming red, star-shaped Poinsettias are known as "The Flower of the Holy Night" or the "Flame Leaf Christmas Star" in the United States.

One of the most popular flowers in Central America, it was brought here by Dr. Joel Poinsett, the first US ambassador to Mexico, over 100 years ago. The legend of the Poinsettia also comes from Mexico and explains how this flower came to represent the deep love of innocent hearts shown, by poor children, for the Baby Jesus.

Once upon a time, two very poor children lived in a village in Mexico. They were a brother and sister named Maria and Pablo. Just like all the other children in the village, Maria and Pablo looked forward to the special Christmas parade and the annual Nativity play. During this Nativity play, a large manger scene was set up in the village church. All the children of the village marched in the Christmas parade to bring their presents to the Baby Jesus on Christmas Eve.

Maria and Pablo loved Jesus ans the season of His birth very much, but they had no money to buy a gift for Him. That evening as they walked to join the other children in the Christmas parade, they took the long route in hopes that they might be

able to find some flower blossoms to lay before the manger of the Christ Child. But they couldn't find any.

Although they were sad at heart and quite disheartened by their poverty, they picked the prettiest green leaves they could find, squared their shoulders, and joined the parade of children. The other children teased them cruelly for bringing "weeds" to the Christ Child, yet Pablo and Maria braved their way to the Nativity Scene, knelt in worship, and placed the greenery carefully around the manger. As the children lifted their heads, a miracle occurred. Bright red star-shaped flowers burst forth from the greens and were the most beautiful of all the gifts that the Christ Child had received that day.
