From the Pastors

Dear Parish Family,

In Matthew we are told that wise men, or magi, brought gifts of gold, frankincense, and myrrh to the Christ child. Frankincense and myrrh are spices taken from certain species of trees. When the bark is cut, a resin oozes out and is harvested.

lesus received from the wise men gifts appropriate to a king. Psalm 72 refers to kings bearing gifts to the King of Israel. It is from this text that we get the idea that the three wise men were kings. Christ is King of Israel and of the universe.

The wise men and/or their gifts are mentioned in several Christmas carols. Among the hymns are "What Child is This," "Angels from the Realms of Glory," and "The First Noel."

Two of the gifts were incense. Incense gives off a pleasant scent when burned. It was used in the Temple in Jerusalem. It has been used in the Church for many centuries and continues to be used in Roman Catholic, Eastern Orthodox, Anglican, and Lutheran churches. A rubric for Evening Prayer in the *Lutheran* Book of Worship reads, "The use of incense is appropriate as Psalm 141 is being sung."

Incense in Church symbolizes the prayers of the people to God and our sanctification through Jesus Christ. The Book of Revelation describes worship in heaven. "And when he (Christ) had taken the scroll, the four living creatures and the twentyfour elders fell down before the Lamb, each holding a harp and golden bowls full of incense, which are the prayers of the saints. And they sang a new song . . ." (Revelation 5: 8-9a ESV)



Bible for China - You Made It Happen

Thank You!

The good people of Holy Trinity clearly desire that their Chinese Christian brothers and sisters can also hold the Word of God in their hands and read the Holy Scriptures in their own language. The generosity of this congregation led to \$650 being sent to Asia Harvest to print and distribute Bibles in China. Since a printed and distributed Bible costs \$1.80 and Asia Harvest has a current matching grant, Holy Trinity has helped to make possible not 360 Bibles but 720 Bibles! What a wonderful way to celebrate Bible Sunday at our church when our third grade children are presented with their own Bibles.

China has 29 provinces in which Bibles are delivered. There is no province without Christians or Bibles. As 2013 drew to a close, Asia Harvest tallied almost 7 ½ million Bible having been printed and delivered in China since this project began. Asia Harvest ensures that their coworkers provide detailed reports, which allow them to keep track of every Bible they print. They have created a distribution map which appears on the following page.

They write in their December newsletter: "We are partnering with house churches in China in a long-term project to provide Bibles for Christians. We receive countless requests for God's Word from church leaders throughout the country. These Bibles are distributed free of charge, equipping the Body of Christ and helping add fuel to the revival in China. ..On behalf of all the grateful believers in China, thank you and God bless you!"

Thanks to the grace of God and your prayers and generous support, Asia Harvest recently passed the milestone of 7 million Chinese Bibles printed and delivered to the house churches in China. Our coworkers provide detailed reports, which allow us keep track of every Bible we print and to create this distribution map. This years topic will be based on: Joseph: How God Builds Character by Paul Borthwick.

January Topic:

We are off and running in the New Year when we continue our story of Joseph with Chapters 4 & 5 of our Bible study.

Chapter 4 (Sexual Purity: When All Else Fails - Run!) will demonstrate that character, tested by moral temptation, is ultimately lived out in our daily choices, especially the choices that no one sees except God. This chapter will give us an account of the life of Joseph, which has been paralleled with the life of Christ as described in Matthew 4. Before Joseph's or Jesus' greatest impact was felt, there was a test, a temptation that had to be passed. The biblical equation is clear: testing and temptation often precede character development and maximum usefulness to God.

In Chapter 5 (The Integrity of a Servant), we'll find encouragement to be obedient servants, even when we find ourselves in situations that we would never choose. The Bible is full of stories about the people of God living in adverse circumstances. If we define prison as "any undesirable circumstance that we find ourselves in that we would never choose and from which we'd like to be released," the Bible has much to say to us. Joseph's example teaches about the grace of God for His people while facing adversity.

In the attitude of prayer and quietness, ask yourself this: When am I most vulnerable to temptation...in times of loneliness, in times following great success, other times? Reflect on what would be the most difficult freedom for you to lose? If you lost it, how do you think that loss would affect your relationship with God?


Each personal care kit contains the following:

A Word from the Philippines

We have all been so concerned about the devastation that resulted from the typhoon in the Philippines. Here is a letter from Pastor Alex who lives and ministers among the people. He is associated with In Jesus' Name Ministries (www.injesusname.org) as their Philippines Director and partner organization Hope and Helps Ministry (www.hopeandhelps.org), both based in Virginia. Greetings to you from the Philippines.

Jesus loves you and so do I.

Thank you for keeping in touch with us. Thank you for contacting people to help us. Thanks a million. Please extend our thanks to the ones who have so far.

Our mission team ministering to the churches has been to the islands devastated by the super typhoon Hayian. I have seen with my own eyes the extent of the damage and immensity of needs to help our brethren recover.

My heart is so heavy of seeing with my own eyes the typhoon destruction in my country the Philippines. Everywhere we went at Guiuan and Tacloban, I tried to hold back my tears in my eyes and fought the surging overwhelming compassion just to share hope and strength to my countrymen. At the end of the day I felt bad, thinking of some of my countrymen, especially our politicians being insensitive to the seriousness and desperation happening in my ruined homeland. It's like being bombed and combed by ravaging destructive force of nature. The first day I arrived in the town of Guiuan, I could not swallow my food to eat and could not sleep, not just because of discomfort away from home but with the immensity of the needs. I kept my focus to get the churches and believers to take this opportunity to share Christ and the Gospel to the lost and to strengthen the believers to do the work of the Gospel.

Many are suffering here with hunger and this will last for months and even years without God's help and healing grace. So we pray that God will bring healing through the prayer relief team that we will deploy to the different places in our country where we have our network of churches.

Please pray with us that the presence of God will be with us as we continue reaching out to souls for Christ. We want to strengthen and edify the body of Christ who had been greatly affected by the typhoon. Many had lost church buildings. Many are homeless, staying on the streets and shanties made from the salvaged materials they could find. May Hope and Helps Ministry shine in the hearts of our brethren here. As soon as the financial donations will arrive, we will continue to the urgent relief operation and ministry to the believers and the churches.

Our Vision Is Now Your Vision!

Our new vision at Holy Trinity is to seek your vision for new ideas and areas to explore!

We invite everyone who feels excited by a new concept for this congregation, passionate about a cause, and/or called by God to serve in a particular way to step forward and offer their thoughts. In other words, the vision is to empower each person who has a vision first to share ideas and then be willing to commit to introducing and shepherding a project or program.

How has this new vision emerged? Over the past year, a group of church members met as the Vision Committee. As often happens in a collaborative effort, a group begins in one direction and emerges in another that proves surprising and hopeful.

The group read *Power Surge* by Lutheran pastor Michael Foss and developed an appreciation for his idea of emphasizing discipleship in a congregation. This means that lay people take greater ownership of ways to serve their church. It also very importantly means that their voice, creative ideas, and leadership are welcomed to take a church in new directions and help members embark on new paths to the glory of God.

We believe that every member of this church has been gifted by God to serve. Some are called to create and lead while others may be called to implement visions. The vision of the Vision Committee is to engage more church members in the life of Holy Trinity. We want to hear from YOU!

How Do Visions Become Reality?

When you have an idea you would like to explore for Holy Trinity, determine which of the standing committees might be best suited to consider and back your plan. That also means which committee is most likely to give you any needed funding to make your idea a reality. Contact the chair and ask to present at a committee meeting. As the committee endorses ideas, the liaison person will take them to Council for approval. You can then seek volunteers who share your enthusiasm and are willing project workers. Then voila, you are launched.

Some examples of recent ideas that have either been accomplished or are currently being researched are: church magnets, church welcome bags of goodies for new members and visitors, and streaming our services online.

Committee Reference Guide

Christian Education: Oversee the Sunday church school and all other Christian education programs. It encourages using teaching and worship materials published or approved by the North American Lutheran Church, and works to introduce and promote church family devotional books and materials. Social Ministry: Extends Christian compassion and aid to the ill, aged, orphaned, underprivileged, imprisoned, and, in general, all in need of assistance. Staff Support: Strengthens the ministry of the pastors, staff, and congregation as a whole. It consists of two teams: 1. Personnel Team to prepare and update job descriptions, establish compensation and benefits, and encourage participation in appropriate continuing education programs. 2. Pastor-Parish Relations Team to act as an open communication channel regarding conditions and attitudes within the congregation and serve as an agent of reconciliation when there is conflict. Stewardship: Encourages the expression of Christian faith in daily living by helping to teach the Christian use of money that leads church members to higher levels of proportionate giving for the Lord's work and by promoting the practice of spiritual gifts. Worship & Music: Assists in assuring that worship is conducted regularly and in accordance with the liturgy of the North American Lutheran Church, that competent worship assistants are recruited and trained, and that hymnals and other devotional materials are provided and properly cared for. This committee also arranges for the care of paraments, vestments, and musical instruments; and, in consultation with the pastor, the organist, and the choir directors, it may furnish music supplies appropriate to worship.
