From the Pastors

Dear Parish Family,

We have now come to the 500th anniversary of the Lutheran Reformation. On October 31, 1517 Martin Luther, an Augustinian monk, nailed Ninety-five Theses for debate on the Castle Church (All Saints' Church) door of Wittenberg in Electoral Saxony, a princely state in the Holy Roman Empire (Germany).

The ultimate result was a split in the Western Church. Was this break in the Church worth the gains? The Reformation of Luther put front and center the doctrine of justification that taught that by grace through faith we are justified and reconciled to God. We have contributed nothing to our salvation. Christ alone by His death and resurrection did all the work.

Luther directed his criticism at the penitential system of the time including the payment for indulgences whereby one receives remission from purgatory and can pay to have relatives already there gain an exit from it.

An outcry in Rome and elsewhere concerning Luther's position led to his excommunication in the Papal Bull *Decet Romanum Pontificem* ("It befits the Roman Pontiff") in 1521. Luther burned Pope Leo's warning to him in *Exsurge Domine* the year before.

Luther eventually left the monastery. During the years following Pope Leo's bull, the Evangelical Church emerged. The Council of Trent of the Roman Catholic Church that began meeting before Luther's death entrenched itself against the thinking of Luther and the Lutheran Reformation. After years of deliberation of this Council hopes for reunification faded to oblivion.


Luther wrote prolifically—sermons, lectures, and treatises. Justification by faith was always his central concern. In the *Heidelberg Disputation* we first heard of his theology of the cross.

Today the Church is divided as it has been for five-hundred years. In America hundreds and hundreds of church bodies exist. Was the Reformation worth it? If one weighs the Gospel against unity, the Gospel should be preferred. In the mean time we extend the hand of friendship to our Roman Catholic brothers and sisters and continue the dialogue, hopefully increasing understanding and unity. Again this January we will meet with the pastor and people of Our Lady Help of Christians for dialogue and fellowship.

For now, we celebrate the Reformation. Join us on Sunday, October 29, Reformation Sunday for a beautiful morning service and for a concert at 3:00 PM.

DUTY AND DELIGHT

Written by Pastor Gerald A. Miller from Duty and Delight Stewardship Program introduced at the NALC 2017 Convocation.



Two Important Words

When it comes to words and what they describe, few are more important than "duty" and "delight". To be sure, most of us have thought about both more than once. But most of us would also benefit if we gave them some further attention.

This is especially true if we hear these words describing two important motivators in our lives before God. Webster's Dictionary defines "motive" as "something (as a need or desire) that causes a person to act". So, what is it that motivates us, and what role, if any, is played by duty and delight?

Two Different Things

"Duty" has to do with what is "owed", with "obligatory tasks, conduct or service", with "moral or legal obligations." In a now-famous speech

to The Corps of Cadets at West Point, General Douglas MacArthur once said:

"Duty, Honor, Country -- those three hallowed words reverently dictate what you ought to be, what you can be and what you will be."

West Point, New York, May 12, 1962 Duty has to do with "ought" and "should".

Although it begins with the same letter of the alphabet, the word "delight" describes something different. Delight is things that "bring the greatest pleasure," that "offer the highest joy." Delight isn't defined by what is owed, but rather by what is truly enjoyed at the deepest possible level.

Listen to a vocalist or musician, and one can sometimes tell whether what's being offered comes simply from a duty pursued or from a deep sense of personal delight.

Both Are Addressed in Scripture

Both duty and delight are referenced repeatedly in Scripture. But there is one surprise in this repetition. Contrary to what we may think, the Biblical words for "delight" are found far more frequently than the Biblical words for "duty". To some extent, this frequency depends on the translation one is reading and on how certain Hebrew and Greek words are rendered. But, when it comes to the two English words themselves, for every occurrence of the word, "duty", there are approximately seven occurrences of the word "delight". Is that merely coincidental, or important for us to note?

Biblical Examples of "Delight"

As mentioned, for every Biblical occurrence of the word "duty", there are approximately seven occurrences of the word "delight". Of these, roughly half speak to instances of God's own delight, especially in His own called servants. The other half speak to instances of human delight, especially human delight in God and the ways of God.

Stewardship Thoughts for October



Examples of God's own delighting:

In Proverbs 8: 29-31, the Wisdom of God is described as God's delight (Hebrew "shaashuim") and as something **delighting** in God's human creation:

"...when He marked out the foundations of the earth, the I (Wisdom, cf. 8:1,12) was beside Him, like a master workman, and I was daily His delight, rejoicing before Him always, rejoicing in His inhabited world and delighting in the children of man."

Many understand this "Wisdom" in Proverbs 8 as a reference to Christ Himself, "the first-born of all creation: through Whom "all things were created: (cf. Colossians 1: 15-16).

Numbers 14:8, Joshua and Caleb proclaim: "If the Lord **delights** (Hebrew "chaphets") in us, He will bring us into the land and give it to us, a land that flows with milk and honey."

In Psalm 18:19, David writes: "He brought me out into a bro

"He brought me out into a broad place; He rescued me, because He **delighted** (Hebrew "chaphets") in me."

In Isaiah 42:1, the prophet says of a coming chosen one:

"Behold, my servant whom I uphold, my chosen, in whom my soul **delights** (Hebrew "ratsah")..."

In Micah 7:18, the prophet asks and then proclaims:

"Who is God like you, pardoning iniquity and passing over transgression for the remnant of His inheritance? He does not retain His anger forever, because He **delights** (Hebrew "chaphets") in steadfast love."

Examples of human delighting:

In Psalm 1: 1-2, the psalmist writes:
"Blessed is the man who walks not in the counsel of the wicked, nor stands in the way of sinners, nor sits in the seat of scoffers; but his delight (Hebrew: "chephets") is in the law of the Lord..."

In Isaiah 58: 13-14, we read:

"If you, call the Sabbath a **delight**...then you shall take **delight** (Hebrew: "anag") in the Lord, and I will make you ride on the heights of the earth;..."

Again, the psalmist in Psalm 112:1 writes: "Blessed is the man who fears the Lord, who greatly delights (Hebrew: "chamad") in His commandments!"

In Psalm 119: 47:

"...for I find my **delight** (Hebrew: "shaa") in Your commandments which I love."

And in Psalm 40: 8:

"I **delight** (Hebrew: "chamad") to do Your will, O my God; Your law is within my heart."

John Newton, author of the famous hymn "Amazing Grace", also authored another hymn with this verse:

"Our pleasure and our duty, though opposite before, since we have seen His beauty are joined to part no more."

Prayerfully give thought to whether you consider your financial participation in the life of Holy Trinity and it's ministries as a **duty** or a **delight**.

Stewardship Weekend will be November 11 & 12, 2017

What do we mean by the term Stewardship Weekend? It is the name we use for the Weekend on which we return our Pledge Card for the support of the church program in the New Year beginning in January.

How do I get a *Pledge Card?* You will get one via e-mail during October. Others will be available in the narthex.

Why should I return a Pledge Card? Can't I just put my offering in the offering plate at worship? The church has many expenses for curriculum materials, heat, light, building upkeep, salaries, insurance and other things. These expenses must be budgeted in order that we may know what kind of program of worship, fellowship, education, music, evangelism and other parts of our witness can be carried out -- and what we can do for others. Unless our members decide in advance the amount they can give we can't plan an effective ministry.

What if I return a Pledge Card and then suffer financial reverses during the year that make it impossible to pay that amount? The Church is the Body of Christ; it is not a loan company. If circumstances you did not foresee make it necessary to reduce or even cancel the amount you thought you could give, all you need to do is to tell God. True Christians also make adjustments upward when their incomes are increased or they receive unexpected additional income during the year.

Will I be solicited personally in my home?

No. You will never receive a telephone call or visitor soliciting you for money. You will receive e-mails that we hope you will read carefully and prayerfully.

Does this church talk about money all the time? No. This church is not always talking about money. The church is always talking about Jesus Christ. It is only with money that the program of the church as we know it today can continue to exist.

Why does the church ask for an increase in giving from each of us every year?

Every year deeply committed Christians who gave substantially either die, experience grave financial reverses, or move to other communities. It is only with new and increased pledges that we can replace this loss. We especially hope that those who give \$5 a week or less will increase their giving by \$2 or more a week.

How much should I give? Did you know that Holy Trinity presently receives offerings from approximately 320 households. Of these, 240 households give \$1 - \$25 per week. If each of these households were to increase their giving by \$2.00 per week, Holy Trinity would have \$20,000 more per year. The remaining 80 households give more than \$25 per week. If each of these households were to increase their giving by \$5.00 per week, we'd have another \$20~000. A small amount from many families would make a huge difference to Holy Trinity for next year's budget.

When is Stewardship Sunday?

Stewardship Sunday is the Second Sunday in November. Please prayerfully consider increasing the amount you give to Holy Trinity by just \$2 to \$5 a week. Please also think about participating in Sinply Giving.



Simply Giving

What is Simply Giving? It is a convenient, safe, and simple way for you to handle church offerings through electronic fund transfers directly from your checking or savings account. This automated program allows payments to be deposited directly into Holy Trinity's account on a steady, uninterrupted basis, providing the church with greater financial stability, less bookkeeping, and more confidence in meeting financial obligations. Many people already know how convenient electronic fund transfers are in paying bills and simplifying their records.

How does Simply Giving work? Church members who wish to give their offering through electronic transfer fill out a Member Enrollment and Authorization Form, indicating the amount they wish to have withdrawn and the frequency B weekly (Monday), semimonthly (1st and 15th), or monthly (1st or 15th). They also attach a voided check or savings deposit slip. These forms may be placed in the

Jehoiada Chest at a service on the second Sunday in November, turned in to the church office, or placed in the offering plate at any time. The church submits this information to Vanco Services, LLC, a Minnesota-based financial-technology services company.

Who sees the information on the Enrollment Member and Form? Authorization The church secretary and financial secretary process these forms for Holy Trinity and keep this information confidential. Vanco Services, LLC employees who process the information at their end are bonded and have signed confidentiality agreements. None of the participant information is shared with any other organization.

How much does this program cost?

All Simply Giving transaction fees are paid by
Holy Trinity Lutheran Church. Donors pay
nothing to use this service.

Is there a minimum amount? Yes. \$5 is the minimum amount per transaction.

If participants have a joint signature account, do both parties need to sign the form? Only one signature is required.

How do participants change the amount, account and/or frequency of their contribution, and how quickly is it processed? You can change the amount, the account from which it is withdrawn, and/or the frequency of withdrawal by completing a new authorization form. You request this form from the church office, fill it out, and return it. If you are changing the account, you must also attach a voided check or withdrawal slip. Within a week, your request is faxed and processed.

When and where should I turn in my Member Enrollment and Authorization Form? You may bring your completed form with the attached voided check or deposit slip to one of the worship services during Commitment Weekend, the second weekend in November. A time will be provided at each worship service to place your information in the Jehoiada chest. Or you may place your information in the offering plate at any worship service that is convenient for you. Or you may bring it to the church office at any time.

How do participants keep a record of the amounts they have contributed? The participant's bank statement will include an itemized list of all electronic fund transfers from their account. A record of these transactions will also be provided on annual offering statements.


What if a transaction is rejected due to non-sufficient funds, closed account, etc.? This information will be emailed or faxed to the congregation immediately after Vanco Services, LLC receives notification from the bank. The church financial secretary will contact the person to determine together how to proceed.

What are some banking advantages for using electronic fund transfers for church contributions? Electronic fund transfers are safe, reliable, and convenient. All such transfers are governed by strict national rules and guidelines set by the Automated Clearing House Network and

governed by Regulation E of the Federal Reserve. More than four billion electronic fund transfers are processed annually in the United States. This process is more efficient, more secure, and less expensive than credit card transactions and more efficient and timely than check collection.

Some years ago, our Church Council and finance-people examined this program and found it to be a good one. Since then Simply Giving has been offered as a way that members could support Holy Trinity's ministries.

Our financial gifts through the Church are a response to God's abundant gifts to us. Ministries flourish at Holy Trinity because of your faithful giving in response to the gifts of God.

NALC Convocation August 9-11, 2017

2017 NALC Convocation focuses on Discipleship and Reformation

More than 650 NALC members gathered August 9-11 for the 2017 NALC Convocation in Nashville, Tenn., around the theme, "Holding Fast: Being Reformed."

The 500th anniversary of the Reformation provided a focus for the Convocation. The leaders of the largest Lutheran churches in the world were featured speakers for the worship services. The Rev. Dr. Fredrick Onael Shoo, Presiding Bishop of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Tanzania, was the preacher for a festival service observing the Reformation anniversary. The Rev. Yonas Yigezu, President of the Ethiopian Evangelical Church Mekane Yesus, preached for the opening worship of the Convocation Mission Festival. The Rev. Dr. James Nestingen and the Rev. Dr. Nathan Yoder delivered keynote Bible study addresses on Reformation themes. The Rev. Dr. Jared Wicks addressed Martin Luther from a Roman Catholic perspective, and Carmen Fowler LaBerge addressed the Lutheran Reformation from a Reformed perspective.

The NALC's focus on discipleship featured prominently in the Convocation. Bishop John Bradosky provided a keynote address and Bible study on discipleship for the Mission Festival. Discipleship was also a focus of his report to the Convocation and of other speakers and workshops.

The NALC Mission Festival began the Convocation under the theme, "Renewing Congregational Life Through the Word of God." Keynote addresses were given by Bishop Bradosky, the Rev. Dr. Gemechis Buba, and the Rev. Dr. Joseph Parsalaw of the Evangelical Lutheran Church in Tanzania. Church leaders from around the world took part in a panel discussion on congregational life in their countries. Workshops addressed a variety of topics.

Stuff the Truck for NALC Disaster Response was a great success. So many supplies were brought for NALC Disaster Response that a larger truck needed to be obtained. Donated supplies included 400 quilts, 366 health kits, 112 school kits, 70 flood buckets, and 225 Bibles.

The Bishop election process will remain the same as proposed constitutional amendments were not approved.

Elected to the NALC Executive Council to four-year terms were Brian E. Sutton of Statesville, N.C., and Pastor Mark Braaten of Tyler, Texas. Pastor Jeffray S. Greene of Brooks, Ga., and Lyle Hollander of Boyden, Iowa were elected to the Court of Adjudication. The Convocation also ratified the election of Julie Eskeland to the NALC-Canada Section Governing Board.

2018 budgets were approved. The Convocation approved a \$2.1 million operating budget for the NALC. Budgets were also approved for NALC designated funds: \$543,000 for the Theological Education Fund (which includes the North American Lutheran Seminary); \$165,500 for the Great Commission Fund; and \$64,000 for the Disaster Response Fund. Budgets anticipate spending some cash reserves. Delegates also approved a resolution encouraging congregations to increase their benevolence giving to the NALC by at least 1 percent of their congregational budget annually.

The Braaten and Benne Lectures in Theology, the annual theological conference which precedes the Convocation, focused on theological perspectives on the Work of Christ. The speakers were Dr. Don Collett, Dr. Gordon Isaac, Dr. Paul Hinlicky, Dr. David Luy, and Dr. David Yeago.



This adoption needs only a simple majority and is done to make the meeting run smoothly. Among other things, The Rules of Procedure say that Holy Trinity's Annual Meeting will be governed by Roberts Rules of Order, that all speeches will be limited to three minutes, and that anyone can present a resolution but that this resolution must be presented in writing to the Committee on Reference and Counsel by 3:00 p.m. on the Monday immediately prior to Annual Meeting. At the time each resolution is presented to Annual Meeting, Reference and Counsel will advise the Annual Meeting as to whether or not the resolution should be adopted. Copies of these Rules of Procedure and Forms for Resolutions are available in the Narthex.




This Sunday School course continues its run after two years.
