From the Pastor

Dear brothers and sisters in Christ:

A recent controversy over stained glass in a prominent American church — I'll say nothing about the actual controversy, except that it involved older windows, depicting supposedly offensive themes, being swapped out for newer windows, depicting supposedly relevant themes — got me thinking about art, perception, and beauty in Christian perspective.

One might think that we of Holy Trinity should claim no stake in this or any similar quarrel. After all, we don't have stained glass, at least not in our sanctuary! But what we do have is *old stuff*. (Not, of course, as old as in churches with a longer history; not even as old, chronologically, as some of our own people; but representing traditions, designs, and purposes going back many more centuries than the one we've existed as a congregation.)

By *old stuff* I mean things like our altar, pulpit, and font; our pews; our candles; our worship vestments; our organ, pianos, and bells; and many other items and elements, both decorative and functional, gracing the various spaces of our church in addition to the sanctuary, not to mention the shape, form, and structure of the church overall.

I'm actually not interested as much in the oldness of the stuff — except insofar as it makes them part of the God-serving history of Holy Trinity and therefore of the Christian church through the ages — as in the fact that these things continue to contribute, deeply and classically, to the *beauty* of our worship.

Our worship, embodied both in the participating faithful and in the surrounding stuff — and including our life together of service, discipleship, and community — is not beautiful according to some free-floating humanist aesthetic, but according to the glory of the One whose word and work in Christ through the Spirit are the subject, the whole point, of worship from beginning to end.

It's by being drawn into telling, again, the story of God's greatness and God's gospel — and by *not* becoming tools for entertainment, occasions for human pride, or indications of how casual and hip we are — that the old stuff of our church shines with beauty. The altar, pulpit, font, pews, candles, vestments, organ, and all the rest (stained glass, if we had it!) help point to God and to the power of God in Jesus, or they are worse than useless.

Something similar can be said of our attachment to an ancient liturgical tradition with all its odd, old complexity. (I salute our guest organists and pianists for their courage, plunging with us into the twists and turns of our service!) We do it, not because it meets our needs or tickles our fancies, but because it speaks of God's love and of God's kingdom, and just in so speaking is as participatory, as absorbing, and as gorgeous as it is.

That's why I'm prepared to argue for "traditional" liturgy with its "traditional" trappings: because it's better at getting us out of our experience and self-obsession, out of our craving to be fashionable and popular, out of ourselves, and — this is key — facing the holiness, the *beautiful* holiness, of the Lord. A foretaste of the feast to come!

Generosity's Ripple Effect

We are all familiar with Jesus' observation of the widow in the temple who put into the offering her last two coins (Luke 21:14).

Jesus makes the point that the poor widow gave more than everyone in the temple because she gave out of her poverty all that she possessed, and she gave it to God as an act of worship. That story is indelibly marked in the minds of all who love Jesus and are passionate about stewardship and generosity. That nameless widow is a hero of giving.

There is a story that is probably less well known than the widow's mite, a story about a community which gave out of its poverty. Paul tells the story about the church in Macedonia in 2 Corinthians 8. He remarks that this faith family was experiencing a "severe test of affliction" and that they were in a state of "extreme poverty." Nonetheless, they gave an offering, a collection to be delivered to the saints in Jerusalem, not only according to what they could afford, but well beyond that! In fact, Paul says, they begged for the chance to give to the collection that would provide relief to brothers and sisters they had never met!

All of this occurred because of the great joy the Macedonians had in the Lord. Their abundant joy caused them to be extremely generous. It is important to notice the order of things here: first, the Macedonians gave of themselves to the Lord. They gave their hearts and their lives to Christ, by the will of God. Second, they gave of themselves to Paul and his companions. Third, they gave overwhelmingly of their possessions in service to those who were suffering, though they themselves were suffering. This is the miracle of faith in our lives. We are transformed by the love of Christ which brings us great joy, and in that joy we are compelled to be generous which brings us even more joy.

As leaders and members of our faith community here at Holy Trinity, the Holy Spirit works to form us into generous people. As we grow in faith and generosity, we set a powerful example to those around us that there is great joy in giving. As our congregation becomes more generous and more trusting in God's ability to provide, our mission and ministry expand beyond our imagination. The generosity we express creates generosity amongst those for whom we act generously.

A ripple effect of giving is started. People are moved to joy! For those still on the sidelines of ministry and mission, our generosity connects people and creates new relational bonds which strengthen the body of Christ as they step out in faith to engage in a cause greater than themselves.

Generous God,

Teach us to be joyful givers, recognizing that all we have comes from you in the first place. May we use the gifts you have graciously given us for the sake of the world you love, so that all would come to know your Son, Jesus Christ, our Lord. Amen.


Never Stop Learning


The class meets in **Fellowship Hall** following the worship service each Sunday. The Holy Spirit is our Teacher and Pastor Guenzel facilitates the discussion.



October's topic: The Leader and the Connector

"And (John) looked at Jesus as he walked by and said, 'Behold, the Lamb of God!' The two disciples heard him say this, and they followed Jesus." (John 1: 36 - 37)

Everything changed for Peter and Andrew that day. Although brothers from the fishing town of Bethsaida, they were more different than alike. Peter was passionate, forceful, a natural leader. Andrew, by contrast, was more thoughtful, easygoing and resourceful. The day Andrew was discussing spiritual matters with his mentor, John the Baptist, Jesus came walking by. "Look, the Lamb of God!" John exclaimed. That five-word sermon was all Andrew needed. He left John standing there and went off to learn everything he could about Jesus. This month, we will explore not only the contrasts in Peter himself but also the contrasts between the brothers in Peter as a Leader and Andrew as the Connector.


